

# On The Road Dual Lane Vessel Transport

escort vehicles, police escorts,

When this vessel needed to be transported from a fabricator in Louisiana to a Texas industrial site Berard got the call. Weighing at 320,000 lbs., the vessel required transport on 10 axles of Faymonville DualMAX dual lane platform trailers. Kenworth C500 pull and push trucks were used to power the load. Berard determined a suitable route at 280 miles for the 200' long, 18' high, and 600,000 lb. gross weight vehicle. In 2 days, the load was safely moved on time to the destination.













Winter weather can expose outdoor workers to frostbite, hypothermia, and cold stress, all of which can be fatal. It is important to know the wind chill temperature to better prepare and perform the work safely.

Follow these work practices to stay safe in cold weather:

- Know the symptoms of cold stress; reddening skin, tingling, pain, swelling, leg cramps, numbness, and blisters.
- Dress properly; wear at least three layers of loose-fitting clothing, insulated gloves and boots, and cover your head.
- Monitor your physical condition and that of your coworkers.
- Stay dry and pack extra clothes; moisture can increase heat loss from the body.
- Take frequent breaks in warm, dry areas.
- Drink warm liquids.
