## **Equipment Used:**

20 axle lines of spmts, barge ramps, winch trucks, ballast pumps, and jacking systems Keeping it level was the name of the game when Berard loaded out these two oddly shaped living quarters in Galveston, Texas. Each living quarters weighed 300 tons, and the center of gravity was located two feet from the edge of the base frame. Berard utilized twenty axle lines of Goldhofer PST-ESE Transporters, barge ramps, winch trucks, ballast pumps, and jacking systems to lift and load out the structures. From there, Berard designed and implemented a stow and lashing plan for the journey to Houma, LA via the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway. With only a few feet to spare, the living quarters traveled through 75' wide locks, and beneath 72' high bridges, all part of the Berard plan. In less than two days, both living quarters were jacked up to transport height, loaded onto the 250'x72'x16' deck barge, and secured for departure.

## **Equipment Used:**

24 axle lines of spmts, barge ramps, winch trucks and steel plating Working under tough conditions comes with the job and this project was no different. Berard loaded out two of these 223' long x 18' diameter vessels in Morgan City, Louisiana. These vessels are part of a dual tank barge and become a permanent part of the barge. The area had experienced torrential rainfall while the team setup in preparation for the loadout. Steel plate had to be laid out due to the soggy ground conditions to help support the 290 tons as they traveled to the barge. The team slowly loaded the vessels onto the barge once in place, were moved under a floating crane and the vessels were hoisted off of the spmts. Once lifted, the barge was removed from underneath and the receiving barge was then positioned in its place. The vessels were then lowered into place completing another successful and safe project.
