

20 axle lines of SPMTs, barge ramps, cribbing and winch trucks

It's imperative that shipyards keep their projects moving. Berard has been helping ship builders do just that for decades. We're an important part of maintaining the tight schedules our clients demand. Berard recently transported this tugboat for a client from the fabrication yard to a launch barge. The team used several levels of blocks to conform to the hull and raise the height of the vessel so the keel could achieve ground clearance during the over the ground transport as well as in the load out phase of the project. Once on the barge and in position, the team lowered the vessel and removed the layers of blocks as they went to set the vessel onto the client's cribbing supports. The team once again did a great job and we thank both them and our great client!







In keeping with the shipyard theme, we take a look back on a move we did back in the early 1990s. At this time in Louisiana, casinos were allowed only on water, and thus the casino boat was the preferred choice. Berard was commissioned to move several of these behemoths in that time. This one in particuliar weighed in at 1000 tons. The team used series of 75 ton hydraulic dollies and bolster beams to support and transport the massive vessel from the yard to a dry dock where the boat would be finished and launched into the water. Crane mats were laid to support the weight as the team slowly moved along the transport path. Berard has been the premier choice for shipyards then and now. Symptoms of Heat Stroke


- May be confused, unable to think clearly, pass out, collapse, or have seizures (fits)
