

Weight: 90,000 lbs

130'L x 29'W x 15'-9"H

Equipment Used: 3 axle drop deck with stinger axle, 4 axle Trail King steerable dolly, double turntables, escort & support vehicles

The team had a very unusual transport to undertake recently. The USAF B1 Bomber named Apocalypse had to be moved from the airplane bone yard in Tucson, Arizona to the NAIR facility in Park City, Kansas. Our dedicated team members averaged over 200 miles per day at 29' wide through 5 states with a couple of 300 plus mile days included in the 1,460 mile trip. There were several mountains with steep grades as well as many tight 90 degree turns to get the 130' long cargo around. The trailer configuration really performed as designed and made those obstacles easier to tackle. The team was overjoyed to see many people lining the streets of the small towns we passed through and to see the smiles on all the kid's faces as we passed them by. We've moved a lot of cool things, but this one goes in the books as one of the coolest. Thanks to all of our team and to the escort officers in Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas for their assistance with the move.


